

A Look Back At The History of Franklin Square by Paul van Wie

In 1979 the European American Bank at 925 Hempstead Turnpike (formerly the Franklin Square National Bank) was renovated. The old banking room, dating from 1929-1939 was entirely gutted and remodeled. In the process, the marble tellers cages and banking tables were slated for destruction.

The bank thoughtfully permitted the Historical Society to remove the architectural elements and furnishings from the banking room on a weekend in 1979. The team of members who salvaged the items was led by Vice-President William Capoziello. As a result, parts of two teller's cages, two marble and glass banking tables, and various matching accessories such as lamps, wall display units, and waste baskets were removed and reconstructed in the Museum then located in the John Street School. The operation was a complex and challenging task.



Then the Museum needed to vacate the John Street School. The cages and tables were disassembled and stored in the John Street School basement. Eventually they were moved to Washington Street School and reassembled, only to be disassembled once again when the space needs of the school increased. The various pieces were finally moved to the Franklin Square Museum in stages, beginning in early 2019.

The banking tables are each supported by two black marble legs; the marble displaying white streaks. There are brass ornaments on the end sides of each leg. The glass table tops rest on metal foundations which provided space for deposit slips and other paperwork. The tables feature brass lamps and included ink wells. Each table is just over three feet high and the glass tops measure sixty-one inches long and thirty-two inches wide.

These tables, which have journeyed across Franklin Square, are a centerpiece of the Society's historically significant Franklin Square National Bank collection. They assist in illustrating an important chapter in the history of American banking.




The FS Historical Society - Fire Department Pillow

Hello,

My name is Matthew Meaney, and I am a member of Boy Scout Troop 163 in Rockville Centre, and a candidate for Eagle Scout, Scouting's highest award. I am currently working with the Franklin Square Historical Society to build several raised beds in which to plant grasses native to the Hempstead Plains area. This native garden that we will establish will be important to the educational programs of the FS Historical Society. During their visit to the museum, students from the various elementary schools in our town will have the opportunity to plant and tend to the native garden. This experience will be beneficial to the students, as it will allow them to connect to the past and get in touch with the history of our community. In addition to the construction of the raised beds, another part of my project will be identifying the native oak trees on the museum land. It moved to its current location when, in 1911, fourteen acres were purchased from a German farmer in Franklin Square for a retirement home and restaurant. The General Manager is Matt Buck.
